



☐ Key Underwood Coon Dog Memorial Cemetery (D-4)

4945 Coon Dog Cemetery Road; (256) 383-0783

More than 300 coon dogs have been laid to rest in the scenic "Freedom Hills." Unique headstones and epitaphs pay tribute to man's best friend. "Troop" was the first dog buried here in 1937. Call for burial information. Open daylight hours year round. No admission.

☐ Jesse Owens Museum (H-11)

Dedicated June 1996 with the arrival of the Olympic Torch enroute to the Atlanta games, The Jesse Owens Museum & Park is a tribute to the life and legacy of Jesse Owens, track and field great, who captured four Gold Medals at the Berlin Olympics in 1936 shattering Hitler's Aryan supremacy theory. Jesse's athletic and humanitarian achievements are depicted through interactive kiosks, displays, a rare documentary narrated by Owens, memorabilia and a museum store. The park includes a Sharecropper Birth Home Replica, Bronze statue, 1936 Olympic Torch Replica, interactive Broad Jump Pit, Olympic Gold Medal Tree, picnic pavilions, ball fields, basketball court and a playground. Free WiFi. Admission. Call to schedule group tours M-Sat 10 a.m.-4 p.m., Sun 1-4 p.m.. Additional hours by appointment.

Oakville Indian Mounds Educational Center (H-11)

Owned and operated by the Lawrence County School System, the Oakville Indian Mounds Education Center is a free 122-acre park that features a Cherokee Council House-style museum containing over 20,000 artifacts from the local area. Oakville features land that once hosted a 2,000 Native American village in the early Middle Woodland time period. Features now include two Indian mounds, a conical burial mound and a squared-off platform mound, a 5K cross-country trail, a large 20-acre fishing lake, picnic tables, park benches, pavilions and free wi-fi. Canoes and paddleboats are available to rent. Self-guided admission is free. For guided group tours or park rentals, call for fee. M-Sa 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Closed on Sundays and school system holidays.

☐ Bankhead National Forest and Sipsey Wilderness (K-9)

Approximately one mile north of Double Springs. 180,000 acres with an abundance of bluffs, canyons, waterfalls, springs, and lakes. There are nine recreation areas scattered about the Bankhead National Forest, each offering a unique experience of its own. Facilities for camping, picnicking, fishing and swimming are abundant. The forest offers over 90 miles of recreational trails. You can enjoy hiking, bicycle and horseback riding, and a trail for your all-terrain vehicle.

The area consists of 22 acres that will eventually include walking trails for non-boaters that wish to enjoy quiet walks, bird watching, or fishing along the banks of this beautiful natural resource. This 444-mile All-American Road and National Scenic Byway follows an ancient trail carved through woodlands by animals and the moccasins of Native Americans. From Nashville, TN to Natchez, MS, the Parkway connects three states. In Alabama there are interpretive sites for history, nature, bird watching, hiking, biking, boat ramps, picnicking, and camping. Just off the Natchez Trace in The Shoals area (Florence, Muscle Shoals, Sheffield and Tuscumbia), you'll encounter plenty of Alabama visionaries such as the birthplaces of Helen Keller and W. C. Handy, at the Frank Lloyd Wright designed Rosenbaum House, at the Alabama Music Hall of Fame and at FAME Recording Studio.

☐ LaGrange College Site Park (D-8)

On January 11th, 1830 LaGrange College opened with enrollment of 70 male students and became the first state-chartered College in Alabama. Located on a spur of the Cumberland mountain off Alabama Hwy 157 in the East Colbert County at 1491 LaGrange College Rd, Leighton, Alabama the site was listed on the Alabama register of landmarks and heritage in 1976. Since 1998 the LaGrange Living Historical Association has maintained the site by opening the site to tourism, educational classes, and established three funds raising events; Recall LaGrange in May, Haunted Hay Rides in October, and Christmas in the Country in November. The Log Cabin Pioneer Village now located on the site serves as a Chapel, B&B Inn, welcome center, 1800 kitchen, country store, barn, and smokehouse, observatory, and picnic pavilion welcomes visitors daily to the site. Established in 1959, FAME was the first successful, professional recording studio in Alabama. Arthur Alexander's 1961 hit, "You Better Move On," cut here, launched the famous Muscle Shoals Sound. The internationally acclaimed documentary, *Muscle Shoals*, released in 2013, and told the story of FAME, has sold over 350 million copies worldwide. It remains a working studio and continues to attract major recording artists. Open limited hours for tours: Two tours Mon. through Friday: 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. and Tours from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. on Saturday (unless recording session is taking place) Admission.

☐ Natural Bridge of Alabama (L-7)

Birthplace of Helen Keller - Ivy Green (D-6)

Tuscumbia, Ivy Green was built in 1820 by David and Mary Fairfax Moore Keller, grandparents of Helen Keller. The site is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The old "whistle path" carries the visitor to the outdoor kitchen from the main home. Sprinkled around the estate are the Lion's Club's International Memorial Fountain, the "Clearing" and herb gardens, the Carriage House and Gift Shop. Helen Keller's birthplace cottage is situated east of the main house and consists of a large room with a lovely bay window and playroom. The cottage and main home contains many of the original furnishings and items pertaining to the life of Helen Keller, America's "First Lady of Courage." Of particular note is Helen Keller's complete library of Braille



books and her original Braille typewriter. Hours: M-Sa 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Admission.

Three of Alabama's 11 covered bridges can be found in Blount County, nestled into the curves of both roads and rivers, making this county the Covered Bridge Capital of Alabama. All three bridges are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. All have been restored to once again support car traffic – though with a single lane and a speed limit of 5 mph.

Rising 70 feet, **Horton Mill Bridge** stands as the highest covered bridge above any U.S. waterway. The original structure was built in 1894. Construction of the bridge we see today came 40 years later. A 15-man crew completed the 220-foot bridge in a year and a half with lumber bought for \$714. Look for the bridge five miles north of Oneonta on Alabama Highway 75.

Old Easley Covered Bridge is the smallest and oldest of the bridges, its single span is perhaps the most picturesque. Crossing the Dub Branch of the Calvert Prong of the Black Warrior River, Old Easley was used from 1927 until 2009, when it was restored. The bridge sits three miles west of Oneonta, 1.5 miles off U.S. 231.

The third bridge was called **Swann** on one side and Joy on the other, depending on which community you called home. Perched over a scenic gorge, the bridge connected the town of Cleveland to the community of Joy. The triple spans of the Swann Covered Bridge stretch 324 feet, making it the longest covered bridge in Alabama and one of the longest in the U.S. It rises 27 feet above the rocky riverbed of the Locust Fork, a tributary of the Black Warrior River. It lies one mile off Alabama Highway 79, near Cleveland.
